Madeleine had herself asked the really important question that morning, "Where were you when we were crying?" On holidays I've seen many parents out in the evenings with huge buggies containing two children, maybe even three at times, all conked out sleeping, but they were safe and they were with their parents.

One night when he had a temperature I had given him junior disprin, they used to come in blister packs. I was so tired when I eventually got him to sleep that I put these under my pillow meaning to move them in the morning.

I was a child minder in those days and had a toddler the same age as my second son as well as the two I had.

Upstairs as far as I was concerned was just as safe for them to play.

My second son went under my pillow removed the disprin and opened a whole packet. When I saw this I flipped, ambulance hospital, total panic.

After a blood test confirmed what he told me I realised he had been putting each one on a spoon just as he had seen me do, adding water but of course each time the little pill had washed off and down the sink. He had managed to take only one.

There were though 11 in the packet.

Can you imagine what could have happened if he had just eaten them, I still do. I had nightmares.

Trying as hard as I could I was not perfect and I am still not, I don't even wish for perfection, how hard would that be to live with. We just have to try as hard as we can.

I do though try to be understanding when people make wrong decisions because some of mine were not that great.

I believed long before the documentary that these people had felt safe in this resort. If they had felt this area was not safe I do not believe they would have left their children.

HER way. There are still some trust factors with her and HER capabilities as a child compared to my son.. at that age.. She has been pretty good about staying home and not wandering off but, as my other daughter has taught me.. there will be a day.. when she will simply walk away and go as far as she can... I did it. I did it in the care of my babysitter.. HER BACK WAS TURNED and i walked all the way home.. at three or four. I wanted to change my clothes after I had an pottie accident. Thankfully I lived to tell the story.. even through the beating I got later....dry:

It wasnt okay. But, worrying about it wont change what happened. And what happened to her or where she is..
